THE MIZUNA LADY

The Kawawata family's New Year ozōni is a shōyu-based soup with daikon, carrots, gobō, kamaboko and mizuna.

When I went grocery shopping to prepare for our family's traditional New Year's dishes, I couldn't find mizuna at any of the stores I visited. At

Times Supermarket, my last stop for the day, I asked the produce clerk if they had any more mizuna in the back and she said they were sold out but were expecting additional deliveries the next day.

The following morning—already New Year's Eve!—I went back to the market but the mizuna produce bin was once again already bare. But then I spotted a lady getting mizuna from the back. I hurried there and asked the clerk if there was more, but she replied, sorry, no, that was the last of it.

The lady who got the mizuna must've noticed

my look of exasperation and disappointment, and asked, "Would you like to have some?" and cheerfully handed me a bunch. I was so elated and relieved that I finally got my hands on some mizuna,

and was so grateful to her for that. The lady humbly accepted my thanks with a gentle smile and went to continue her shopping.

Returning to the temple, I reflected on what had just happened. In retrospect, I realized I was being so selfish, desperately thinking about getting my own mizuna...my mizuna, my mizuna! How fortunate to meet a sweet lady who offered some to me. If she hadn't offered to share some of her precious bounty

with me, instead of this feeling of gratitude, I might've even harbored resentment toward her. The more I thought about it, the more I was impressed by her generosity and kindness. The lady was, indeed, like a Buddha or a Bodhisattva! Do I have that same kindness for others within me like this lady had?

Among the basic teachings of Buddhism are impermanence and selflessness. Human beings change according to the situation. We change moment by moment. Sometimes I may be an outwardly good person, and sometimes I may become evil. A Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, if you will. I am impermanent,

have no concrete self, and live in a constantly changing world. I have no control of my life, and live myself in the moment.

I recall one of Shinran Shōnin's hymns that goes,

"Although I take refuge in the Pure Land way It is hard to have a true and

sincere mind.

This self is false and insincere; I completely lack a pure mind." In another hymn,

"We are confused human beings listening to the teachings of the Amida Buddha's innermost aspiration. We are bonbu, ordinary humans with blind passions. However, our hearts are in the Pure Land, the world of the dharma that purifies us. "

I think Shinran Shōnin looked into his own self and could not find any good. Thus, Shōnin just depended on the Dharma. Listening to the Buddha dharma is to meet one's true self, and to be born into the Pure Land.

It was a busy end of the year, but I was so fortunate to have encountered The Mizuna Lady. I'm grateful to listen to the dharma again. (With editing assistance from Kevin Kawawata)

お寺に帰って考えてみると、自分にはあのような優しさはあるのかな? またもしあの婦人が水菜を分けてくれなければ、感謝でなく、かえって恨みを持って帰って来たかもしれないのです。

この自分の心は事に応じてコロコロ変わる存在だ。俄者(にわかもの)だと思いました。人間はその状況に応じて変わる俄者なのです。私は一瞬一瞬に変わる存在で,真に良い自分など本来ないのです。

そして親鸞聖人はご和讃を思い 出しました。

> 浄土真宗に帰すれども 真実の心はありがたし 虚仮不実のこの身にて 清浄の心もさらになし

(浄土真宗に帰依する身となっても、我が心が正しく立派になることはあり得ない。外面は誠実をよそおっても、内心はうそいつわりにみちた不実なわが身であって、清浄の心も全くない。注釈:伊藤博之)

またご和讃の中で

超世の悲願ききしより われらは 生死の凡夫かは 有漏の穢身はかわ

らねど 心は浄土に遊ぶなり(帖外 和讃)

"私どもは迷いの凡夫で阿弥陀仏の本願の教えを聞かせていただく事により、煩悩にみちた身であるけれども心は浄土、清浄なる法の世界にあるのです。"と言われております。

仏教の基本的な教えは、無常、 無我、苦、涅槃です。無常だから 無我、変わってゆく世界に生きる 我は常に変わる存在であり、恒久 的な我はないのです。だから今の 自分を生きるしかない。何でもしかねない可能性を持った存在が自分なのです。親鸞聖人は真の善がない自分を見続けられ仏法を頼りに生きられた方でした。仏法を聴聞するとは本当の自分に出会ってゆくこと、また浄土(法の世界)に往生しつつ生活することに水菜夫人の出会いより改めて知らされたことでした。

General meeting held on Zoom in conjunction with Shinnenkai

Our annual General Membership Meeting was held on Sunday, Feb. 28, online on Zoom, immediately followed by a virtual Shinnen Enkai New Year Gathering.

Rinban Kenjun Kawawata greeted attendees with his welcome message to members and friends who logged in the meeting.

Board president Ken Saiki called the meeting to order. After the minutes of the 2020 meeting were approved, he compared the temple's financial condition, 2019 pre-COVID and 2020 yearend. Even with greatly reduced in-person services and other activities, we've been fortunate to see increased donations and dues collection because of loyal member support. Lockdowns and restrictions on Otani Center class attendance. however, have led to markedly reduced rental income. Overall the temple was able to just about break even for the year.

Resident Minister Rev. Steven Toyoshima presented an overview of temple activities for the year, including the pivot to Facebook Live weekly services starting the first week in March, reduction or cancelation of various events due to restrictions on gathering and addition of new ways to continue our mission, such as virtual and remote services and adoption of PayPal to help in collecting funds for the temple.

While the pandemic resulted in the cancelation of the bon dance and a major fundraising event, sales of Mantō-e lanterns went up and were displayed in the temple's hondo as a tribute to loved ones who have passed. He also reported on families adjusting to funeral, special anniversary and shotsuki memorial services conducted virtually.

The board election was done with mail-in ballots. Marian Emi Tsuji was reelected for a three-year term set to expire on Feb. 25, 2024. Rinban Kawawata conducted an installation ceremony online.

The meeting was adjourned, then followed immediately by the start of the Shinnen Enkai, emceed by Rev. Steve Toyoshima, who introduced our special guest speaker.

Rev. Patti Nakai, a Sansei from Chicago, studied under Dr. Nobuo Haneda before receiving her master's degree in Shin Buddhist Studies from Otani University and *kyoshi* ordination as a Higashi Honganji minister.

After eight years as a part-time minister at the LA Betsuin, she returned to her hometown in 1995, serving as Associate Minister at the Buddhist Temple of Chicago until she was named Resident Minister in 2013.

Rev. Patti selected two verses of Shinran Shōnin's Jōdo Wasan (Verses of the Pure Land) to illustrate her theme, "Relying on Kindness," singing them to the melody of the gatha, Nori no Miyama, and even doing an encore.

Rev. Patti described Amida's "protection" as unlike a protective spaceship hovering above, beaming force fields of compassion on us, but more like ordinary water, surrounding us in many shapes and forms, inside of us, and everywhere we may happen to be. How comforting to think of such ubiquitous 24-hour protection.

Rev. Patti used the Chicago temple's annual Summer Festival as an example of relying on kindness. The sale of chicken teriyaki at the festival is a major fundraiser for the temple. As individual hard work and self-sufficiency are considered virtues, members put much time and effort into preparing the food for sale. The members, especially vulnerable elders, however, would be placed in an uncomfortable position if asked to help with the risk of COVID infection.

Asking for help from a Japanese restaurant to prepare the chicken teriyaki is an exercise in kindness. Temple members can remain safe, the restaurant obtains some business in a difficult time and the community receives safely prepared food...a win-win proposition all around. Through collaboration we can find ways to mutually benefit.

Rev. Patti fielded questions and promised to visit Hawaii in person once conditions allow.

As a finale, Rev. Steve randomly selected winners of Longs/CVS and Starbucks gift cards, then closed the 2021 Shinnen Enkai by sharing a video of Ondokusan performed by the Dharma Hawaiians.

Here's hoping next year's General Membership Meeting and Shinnen Enkai will be a live, in-person event with food, fun and fellowship.

Los Angeles Betsuin vandalized; GoFundMe fundraiser initiated

On Feb. 25, the Higashi Honganji Los Angeles Betsuin in downtown LA's Little Tokyo was victim of an act of deliberate vandalism.

A 12-foot-high glass window at the entrance was destroyed, two metallic lanterns were ripped off their concrete bases and two six-foot wooden lantern stands were set on fire.

Shocked and saddened, community partners in Little Tokyo have started a crowdfunding campaign to show love and support for the Higashi temple and set a goal of \$50,000 to help cover the costs of repair and ongoing and future security needs of the temple.

In 2014, Rev. Peter was transferred to the Higashi Honganji Los Angeles Betsuin, which began a new chapter of his life. He currently moderates the temple's

Wednesday Night Study Class. For the past four years, the class has studied the Larger Sutra and Shoshinge. He also advises the Dharma Seeds lay leaders group which studies not only Shin Buddhism, but also the dynamic interaction between its teachings and our American cultural and intellectual traditions.

Rev. Peter is also a musician and was an original member of the Sansei jazz-fusion group Hiroshima for over 10 years. He also spent a number of years as an adjunct music professor at Cal State University Los Angeles.
